The gadget is about the size of an obese ballpoint pen. It has a small covered cutting blade at one end that can be gingerly inserted into a nostril or ear to trim the embarrassing growth.

It can be used wet or dry and has a simple one button on-off switch. It also uses one AA battery which seems to last a long, long time.

It produces a quiet whirling when being used and whisks and mulches as it works. Children and pets might look at you funny when you use it, so close the bathroom door.

tures stand out on the curvy figureeight-shaped cellphone:

First off the device has an integrated FM radio that plays through an optional earpiece designed for the gadget. These cost an additional \$30. You tune into stations using the handset's LCD screen. If a call comes in, the radio cuts out and the call cuts in. Pretty

The device also has a rain jacket. It's a rubber cover called a "SoftWrap" by Motorola that goes over the phone to dress it up. It makes for easier gripping and gives the phone some protection from the elements.

Like most phones these days the V2282 is Web ready. So you can plod through text info from the Web on the handset's four-line display

The device has 11 individual ring styles, though lacks a vibration ring setting. It does however have a stop call alert feature, which halts the ringing of an incoming call, but doesn't answer it. Presumably this would be used to skip calls from someone you don't want to talk to.

Battery time is around 210 minutes of continuous talk time and 135 hours of standby. The device is affordable and has some merits. Teens will probably like what it has to offer.
